Business Licenses

Anyone conducting business in the City of Cannon Beach is required to have a business license.

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Right-of-Way Use Permits

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Short Term Rentals

Any owner of property in an RVL, RL, R1, R2, R3, MP or RAM zone can apply for a 14-day short-term rental permit, provided that they do not already hold a short-term rental permit. Short-Term Rentals are not permitted in accessory dwelling units.

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Tree Removal
